



CSLA Representative Report

Hello Sask Advisers!

I am your Saskatchewan representative for the Canadian Student Leadership Association (CSLA), the organization that puts on the Canadian Student Leadership Conference. I am an executive member of the Saskatchewan Association of Student Council Advisers (SASCA), and have been appointed as our CSLA rep for a two year term. As part of my duties I am in charge of being your Saskatchewan liaison for CSLC.

One of my duties for CSLC is ordering Saskatchewan shirts. Every adult and student delegate must purchase a provincial shirt to wear. These shirts are worn on the opening day of the conference during the opening ceremonies when all of the provincial delegates walk in. Shirts are typically reflective of the province, and everyone looks forward to seeing all the provincial shirts each year. Many delegates will wear their shirt on another day throughout the conference, or trade it for another province's shirt. Other delegates will purchase one to wear, and one to trade. We are in the process of developing this year's shirts. I will email everyone a picture of the shirt with the logo once it is back from the graphic designer. The cost of the shirts will be approximately \$35-\$50. It may be less with the numbers we have, and I will know an exact price very soon. I will be placing the order for the shirts on Friday, June 17th.

I will be using the shirt sizes that you and your delegates entered in your Clearcove registration. Please make sure all t-shirt sizes have been updated in Clearcove by Friday, June 10th! Any delegates with no shirt size will be designated a size large. Please also ask your delegates if any of them would like an extra shirt to trade, and email me with the names of the delegates who want extra t-shirts by no later than June 15th. For first time advisors, most students order two shirts. They like one for themselves and one to trade. An invoice for your shirts will be emailed to you by SASCA prior to the conference, and shirt pick up will take place on the opening day of the conference (or perhaps at precon for those schools attending).

Schools tend to find advisor accommodations at CSLC to be costly, especially if advisors are rooming alone. Please let me know if you if you have a hotel room that you are willing to share with another advisor, or if you are an advisor without a room who is wishing to share. I will try to connect people to make these arrangements in hopes of saving everyone money! For those who are not aware, it is advisable to book rooms at the host hotel for the conference. This hotel is usually where shuttles run from, where social events are held, and where all the action is! This year's host hotel is the FOUR POINTS SHERATON (1-506-739-7321). If you haven't thought about booking accommodations, you should do this as soon as possible to help ensure you get a room in the host hotel. Remember, you do not need to book a room for the pre-conference if you are attending!

Please let me know if you have any questions regarding your CSLC experience. I would be happy to answer any questions you may have, especially if you are a first time advisor. Be prepared to learn lots, network lots, experience lots, and have a fantastic time! Please remember to update all shirt sizes in Clearcove by June 10th! Please send me the names of any delegates who want an extra shirt by June 15th!




Kindersley Composite Bounces Back

The Kindersley Composite School SLC recently held their first ever "Bounce Back Week" to raise awareness of mental health and self-care strategies. The concept of this initiative came from our student leaders who attended the Canadian Student Leadership Conference in the fall. They were passionate about bringing Bounce Back Week to our school. Bounce Back Week was an attempt to reduce the stigma surrounding mental health issues and promote self-care strategies to ALL students. A lot of our students struggle with mental health issues to some degree (or are a support person for someone who does). ALL of our students experience anxiety to some degree. ALL of our students deal with stress in their lives. These messages apply to everyone. This was an attempt to provide our students with the resources to Bounce Back from episodes of anxiety or stressful situations.

We had over 13 presentations throughout the week on topics ranging from personal stories of mental illness and how to cope, anxiety, grief, the science behind mental illness, suicide awareness, meditation, life coaching, yoga and PiYo exercise. Teachers showed videos created to reduce the stigma surrounding mental illness. Our SLC members covered the mirrors in the school with paper covered inspirational sayings for "Mirrorless Monday," and placed positive messages on the bathroom walls. This activity was aimed to remind students and staff that their beauty is so much more than what is in the mirror. Our SLC members also created posters with mental health facts and self-care strategies and hung them throughout the school. All in all we feel that the week was extremely successful!

- -At Valentine's Day we held a cookie sale. Cookies had to be pre-ordered and our very dedicated SRC members spent approx. 4 hours after school baking and decorating over 300 sugar cookies to sell the next day.
- -In conjunction with our School Community Council, we helped organize an afternoon Air Band Competition (students K-12 were mixed together and put into groups of 5-6) and dance. SRC members made up song choice lists for the air bands and helped at the dance by DJ-ing and handing out prizes.
- -In May we held 2 Hat Days where students/staff could donate \$1.00 (or more if they chose to) towards the Ft. McMurray Fire Relief. In these 2 days we raised over \$600.00 for the Red Cross and nearly every student was happy to wear a hat for the day!

Benefits:



After it's all said and done you realize you have only sailed on Oriole for a week but somehow it becomes more than just a ship to you, it becomes a pathway to all the incredible memories that were conceived throughout the week you spent sailing, meeting new and amazing people, and learning through hands on experience what leadership is all about. I believe I speak for everyone who has been a part of the Oriole YAC in saying that to truly understand the impact that the program has on people, you have to be there living it. That being said I will try my very best to share with you what I can about this amazing journey.

One of the things that I admire most about the program is its ability to take 14 strangers from across the country and bring them so close together. We got to know each other pretty well and every crew member was able to inspire all of us in different ways which fit perfectly into our idea of what great leaders should be able to do.

So all in all the YAC is an incredible experience that is like no other. You get to go aboard this amazing ship and meet these new people. Nothing to prove and no one to impress you get to be yourself and make new friends along the way. Whether you're cleaning the deck, peeking the brass, or out adventuring the memories you make will be permanently etched in your mind, as they are in mine. To be given the opportunity to connect with so many amazing people from all over this great nation is something that I will be forever grateful for.
